TEAM LETTER

We're back to the season of harvest, and if you have not done so already, celebrations of the annual cycle of the land coming to an end in Harvest Festival services. Also of course, prayers for the beginning of a new one.

What sort of harvest it will be for the farmers remains to be seen. We have suffered extraordinary weather this summer and quality yields may well have suffered, but as I understand it, there are shortages on a world-wide scale which are certainly affecting prices and may mean better income than expected. I gather that the blight on the countryside – 'set-aside' – is to be abandoned, as the government is now set to encourage maximum production to lead us as a country towards self-sufficiency in food production. Maybe we have had food too cheap for too long; certainly we take it for granted. The harsh reality is that even in those parts of the world where there are dire shortages of food, the responsibility can largely be placed at the door of humanity – through war, floods, bad land management, or the whims of international markets.

'All good gifts around us are sent from heaven above, Then thank the Lord, O thank the Lord, for all his love'

So goes the chorus of the harvest hymn most of us remember well. But do we believe it, or do we believe that, actually, our provision is in the hands of the farmers, politicians, Tesco, or Brussels? I think we have yet to be really aware of the implications of this year, as harvests round the world are safely, or otherwise, gathered in. Pray for our farmers, for whom it is a time of great worry and uncertainty. But I wonder, if God was truly central to our understanding of the harvest, and indeed for our very being, whether our handling of the harvest – and our very being – would be rather different.

Chute Parish Council has arranged a skip for the weekend beginning **Friday 12**th **October** – it will be sited on the village green at Lower Chute for parishioners. Please note this will be a general purpose skip – the content goes to landfill – so is not intended for recycling materials.

Audit of Accounts

You may be pleasantly surprised, some may be amazed, to learn that once again your Parish Council's accounts have satisfactorily completed audit by Mazars. The statement of accounts is now on display on the official notice board at the village hall.

BT Pole at Chute Cadley Green

After 12 months effort we have finally managed to get BT Openreach to concede that, as owners of the Green, Chute PC was entitled to be consulted over the erection of the extra pole. We met with BT representatives recently and they have agreed to attempt to find alternative ways of meeting their needs without the additional pole (the second one). We also obtained their assurance that, this time, they will also consult with the folk who would be directly affected by any alternative proposal. Since they now seem to be behaving in a reasonable fashion I think it behoves us to be co-operative where we can.

Fly Tipping

I was recently told of some fly tipping (in Chantry Lane), and duly reported this to Kennet District Council. They say they are committed to providing a first class service on such reports and certainly demonstrated this – they found, assessed and removed the waste within 48 hours and then apologised for not responding within 24 hours. If you come across any fly tipped stuff you can report it to KDC but, if you prefer, I am content to make the report - just make sure I have full details. By the way, I have discovered that, to enable KDC to take formal action to prosecute the 'fly tipper, the tipped waste sites are necessarily treated rather like a 'crime scene' that is, it is important not to interfere with the waste... just note the details and leave their enforcement team to do the necessary.

Food Waste Digesters

I am told that food waste makes up about 30 per cent of the average household bin but there is no easy recycling option and it usually ends up buried in landfill where it produces the greenhouse gas methane. So Wiltshire County Council has linked up with a company called Green Cone to supply a limited number of food waste digesters to residents, heavily subsidised by the council. A limited number of these digesters are still available at the subsidised prices of £15 for a Green Cone and £20 for a Green Johanna. More information can be found on the Recycle for Wiltshire website or ring 0800 0192064.

FIREWORKS BE SAFE NOT SORRY.....



Your Safety: Our Priority

With Bonfire Night approaching, we here at Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service would like to offer the following information and advice to help you and your family have a safe and happy Bonfire Night:-

Did you know that Fireworks cause hundreds of avoidable injuries every year. In the last five years (2000-2004) 5,647 people were hurt and required hospital treatment. In the same period there were two deaths, in 2004 there were 1,160 injuries. In 2004 the highest number of injuries – 590 – occurred at family or private parties, followed by incidents in the street or other public places and large public displays.

Government statistics show that the most common firework injuries in 2004 were caused by rockets (283), sparklers (149) and air bombs (121). Before you start thinking that it's not going to happen to you, consider this. Last year around half of all injuries happened to children under the age of 16 years of age. That's a lot of kids who may have ugly burn scars – for life!

Please follow the following safety code to ensure you have a happy and safe Bonfire Night celebration:

- 1. Only buy fireworks marked BS 7114.
- 2. Don't drink alcohol if setting off fireworks.
- 3. Keep fireworks in a closed box.
- 4. Follow the instructions on each firework.
- 5. Light them at arms length, using a taper.
- 6. Stand well back.
- Never go near a firework that has been lit. Even if it hasn't gone off, it could still explode.
- 8. Never put fireworks in your pocket or throw them.
- 9. Always supervise children around fireworks.
- 10. Light sparklers one at a time and wear gloves.
- 11. Never give sparklers to a child under five.
- 12. Keep pets indoors.
- 13. Don't let off noisy fireworks after 11pm.

And remember...

Fireworks. Be safe not sorry. Always follow the code.

Firework parties with family and friends have become increasingly popular in recent years. Parties, of course, usually involve the consumption of alcohol. In fact, research shows that at 90% of firework parties in back gardens, alcohol is present.

The same research shows that 84% of respondents said that people setting off their fireworks had consumed at least 2-3 units of alcohol (2-3 cans of beer/lager or several glasses of wine). One respondent said he was so drunk that he had to let someone else take over the lighting of the fireworks.
